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Celebrating Three Decades of High-Quality, Compassionate Care

This month, we celebrate an incredible milestone: 30 years of dedicated service and compassionate care at Augusta Health. Since our opening on September 11, 1994, we have

remained one of only a few communityowned, notfor-profit hospitals in the Commonwealth, marking a significant achievement in

a rapidly evolving healthcare landscape.

The journey to this milestone began in the late 1980s when the healthcare industry faced unprecedented challenges. As community hospitals, particularly in rural areas, faced numerous challenges, a critical decision about the future of healthcare for the community needed to be made. Staunton's Kings Daughters Hospital and Waynesboro's Community

Hospital, two historic institutions that had long served their cities, faced rising costs of technological advancements, lack of space to expand, and the pressures of a changing industry.

In 1988, community leaders representing the governing bodies of each of the two hospitals made the decision to merge, creating a unified community health system dedicated to improving patient care. This merger was not without controversy. The decision to combine required state approval, and despite many opposing the merger, the proposal was approved. The new hospital would be built in Fishersville, with construction breaking ground in the fall of 1991.

On September 11, 1994, the community's new 400,000-square-foot facility with 255 beds opened its doors as Augusta Medical Center. Over the years, as our community grew, we expanded our services

and evolved. In June 2009, changed our name to Augusta Health to better reflect the wide range of services we offer. Our campus now boasts advanced facilities and technology in surgery, cardiology, and cancer treatment-services that were previously unavailable locally.

Today, through a clinically integrated network of employed and private practice medical groups, Augusta Health serves a broad community extending beyond Augusta County, reaching patients in Rockingham, Rockbridge, and Albemarle counties. Last year alone, Augusta Health had over 10,000 inpatient admissions, and Augusta Medical Group, now comprised of over 275 physicians and advanced practice providers, provided 549,829 outpatient encounters to the communities we serve.

Augusta Health has made remarkable strides in evolving its role within the community. To better address immediate

medical needs and broader community health concerns, we have a new 60,000-square-foot Outpatient Pavilion with three state-of-the-art centers for patients seeking imaging, breast care, and outpatient surgical services. We have transitioned from an acute care provider to a comprehensive healthcare system. By leveraging the medical community's expertise and building a shared community vision, Augusta Health sets a high standard for community-centered care. This approach enhances the quality of care and the community's overall

well-being. We remain committed to nurturing our team members and investing in our community. Augusta Health listened to the community and responded by enhancing healthcare access and services with several programs. Implementing the Augusta Health Neighborhood Mobile Clinics that began during the pandemic has been a beacon of hope for vulnerable communities.

The clinic visits 16 monthly sites, including churches, community centers, homeless shelters, and an LGBTO+ center, to provide primary care and other services. Next, we will launch a mobile clinic van to reach even more remote areas of our communities.

We are leaning into the region's need for more access to primary care physicians. We've committed to graduate medical education training for internal medicine residents at Augusta Health who are already improving access to primary care through the new Community Clinic.

This dedication to education and professional development is a testament to our mission to



provide the highest standard of community care expected from Augusta Health.

Augusta Health was nationally recognized twice this year for improving health equity in vulnerable communities. The hospital was amongst three health systems awarded the 2024 Carolyn Boone Lewis Equity of Care Award. Augusta Health was among two national awardees honored at the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Health Equity Conference, receiving the prestigious CMS Health Equity Award.

None of this would have been possible without the incredible support we receive from the community. We are so grateful for our fully dedicated board of directors, all of whom live locally, the medical community, our highly valued team members, our cherished community partners, and generous donors; you all are Augusta Health's heart and soul, the people who make us what we are.

To each of you, we extend our biggest thank you. As we celebrate 30 years of achievement and service, we eagerly anticipate the future with the same dedication to excellence and commitment that has shaped our journey to becoming a national model for community-based healthcare.

Thank you for being an integral part of this journey. We simply could not do this without you.







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A new mission: "To enhance the health and well-being of all individuals in our communities."

Augusta Health's renewed mission statement demonstrates meaningful strides in its approach to community-based healthcare. By emphasizing equality, inclusivity, and a deep understanding of diverse community needs, the organization sets a strong example for integrating these values into healthcare practice. The mission statement revamp in July 2023 was based on insights into equality, inclusivity, team member perspectives, and the differentiation between the community and "communities" in the plural sense, as provided by the Augusta Health Diversity, Equity, Accessibility, and Inclusion (DEA&I) Advisory Committee.

Augusta Health takes a comprehensive approach to improving community well-being.

Augusta Health is committed to promoting community health through various initiatives and programs. As part of Augusta Health's commitment to the community, a Community Health Needs Assessment is conducted every three years to identify the most pressing health needs. Here's a summary of efforts based on the 2022 Community Health Needs Assessment and the actions taken to address the identified needs:

Access to Healthcare

Augusta Health has made significant strides in enhancing healthcare access and services with several key developments:

1. Primary Care Expansion: New primary care locations in Crozet, Buena Vista, Harrisonburg/Rockingham, and Maury River have broadened access to healthcare for individuals across various geographic and socio-economic backgrounds.

2. Specialty Services Expansion and Renovations:

- •Emergency Department Expansion: Upgraded facilities to handle the quantity and severity of urgent and emergency cases better. 3. Neighborhood Clinics: With
- •Outpatient Pavilion: A 60,000-square-foot stateof-the-art facility designed to streamline outpatient care.

- Mary Louise Fisher Breast Center: A dedicated center for breast health services.
- Shenandoah Women's and Augusta Health Care for Women: Addition of services focused on women's health.
- Urology: Addition of service and expanded services in urological care.
- Cardiology: Designated as an American College of Cardiology HeartCARE Center and expanded to the third floor to enhance services for heart health.
- 14 locations, these clinics have reduced the need for emergency contribute to a more accessible room and urgent care visits by providing accessible care to the system in the region.

4.Community Clinic: The clinic provides patient-centered care for various medical needs, including chronic conditions, acute care, and preventative services. It is staffed by resident physicians, medical students, and experienced clinicians.


